



SHOP REFURBISHMENT

Our retail and reception space on the ground floor is in the process of being refurbished. Over the summer, air conditioning has been installed in the café and shop area to provide a more comfortable environment for customers, staff and volunteers, particularly in the hot weather (how much of that have we had this year?!). A new reception desk has been installed to provide a better working space for our helpers in the shop and reception area and improved display shelving arrangements are planned to showcase our local arts and crafts more effectively and enhance customers' shopping experience.

Spotlight on our Volunteers

In this issue: An interview with Ann Waugh

When did you come to this area?

I was actually born in Sanguhar but moved away with my family at a young age and returned in 1968 when I married Willie and enjoyed being a housewife. Originally trained as a nurse, I returned to nursing as a District Nurse in 1981 and in my 23 years saw a lot of changes both in the NHS and in Sanguhar itself. At that time the area had a lot of industry. mainly mining. I am also board member Crossroads Carers here in Sanguhar.



Just after the centre opened, my husband Willie got involved and I started volunteering. It was a project I believed in. Since then I've enjoyed the great variety of 'happenings' such as plays, events, concerts and working in the shop. I've also enjoyed the poetry sessions, especially local poets such as Raymond Kerr and others. The general mix in the programme is very good and encompasses a wide variety of tastes and age groups.

What benefit do you gain from your involvement?

I enjoy working in the shop and helping behind the bar at events. Having worked in the community I already know a lot of people here and in fact am seeing second and third generations coming through. Meeting people and seeing new faces is important as well as keeping me active.

How do you see this develop?

I feel that the role of any volunteer could



well be expanded. For myself perhaps learning more computer skills to help when I'm on duty. However the centre is still less than two years old and is still evolving as are the volunteers' skills in this environment. A main aim is to continue to build on the numbers coming through the door. Everyone is always delighted at the superb facility we have here in Sanguhar.

What message would you like to give our readers?

Mainly to come and try A'

the Airts for yourself. There's always a warm welcome and you can indulge yourself with a cup of coffee in Airtisans cafe'. The programme of events is varied and always increasing. The shop itself stocks work from over 60 crafters and artists - many local - and there is always something new to consider purchasing in all price ranges.

And finally....

I'm involved with the knitting group. Quite a few attend each Monday afternoon and learn from each other. Currently there is a sock project ongoing. I also go to the photography group, mainly to learn how to use my camera but it's also a great opportunity to meet a different group of people. It's been a really good experience volunteering at A' the Airts, especially among friends in my own community. A' the Airts is right in the centre of things here and it is really good to be involved with this exciting venture in my own 'backyard'.

Golden Oldies Newsreel:

Our new annual membership for our "Golden Oldies" social club has proved to be very popular. Our members have enjoyed some great free films recently - including War Horse, The Best Exotic Marigold Hotel, The Iron Lady and Casablanca - and you get a chance to socialise in Café Airtisans afterwards. Films are shown every two weeks on a Tuesday afternoon at 1.45pm.

Annual membership is only £25 per year (or £13 for a six month subscription) and members can bring along a friend occasionally for the price of a guest ticket. We're always looking for ideas for social events for members – please contact us with suggestions.

We are also investigating the use of a community minibus to transport members to Golden Oldies' social events or films. There may be a very small charge for this, but it would open up opportunities for people who have travel or mobility problems. Please let us know if you would be interested in using this service.

Young Airtisans

We also show films suitable for children aged 4 to 12 years of age every Sunday afternoon – a mix of Disney, Pixar and other family classics. Annual membership is only £12 a year per child or £20 for a family membership of up to three children. One adult can accompany the children free of charge. This a great deal! Please ask at reception for an application form and a list of films that we are planning to show.

Fundraising News

Most of our core funding, which helps us to cover our day to day running costs, is provided by the Big Lottery Fund and Dumfries & Galloway Council Area Committee. However, we have been busy fundraising to provide us with the additional resources we need to improve our services to the community.

We are very happy to say that we have recently received a grant from the **Scottish Hydro Clyde Community Fund**, which is managed by the **Scottish Community Foundation**. This will be used to part-fund an additional part-time project assistant post for A' the Airts, initally for one year. (See back page for more information.)

Our arts and crafts classes and groups currently rely heavily on volunteer support and self-help. Whilst they have proved to be very popular, lack of regular professional input does limit our ability to fully develop people's skills. Being able to pay for professional tutors would make a huge difference and we have been busy applying for funding to provide this support. So far we have received two grants (from the **Gannochy Trust** and **Hugh Fraser Foundation**) towards a programme of arts and crafts classes. We are hopeful that we will be able to roll this out soon.

We have also secured a generous grant from the **Voluntary Action Fund**, to help us recruit, train and support more volunteers to undertake jobs like publicity, talking to people, supporting craft groups and looking after the shop. This means we will be able to do more, encourage more people to visit, and have more local people from the community involved in A' the Airts.

Room Hire and Conferencing Facilities at A' the Airts

We are constantly trying to improve conferencing facilities in A' the Airts.

Facilities in our 50 seat theatre have been enhanced recently by installing a new pull-down screen for our digital projector, full surround sound cinema style speakers, accessible HDMI sockets to link laptops to our AV equipment and a new laptop which is dedicated to the use of visiting groups to the Centre.

Our two craft rooms can also be used a breakout or meeting rooms (subject to availability) and catering can be arranged.

All our facilities are available at very competitive rates, and we are ideally located for small conferences, being centrally situated in the South of Scotland on the A76 and on the main Glasgow to Dumfries railway line. Contact us for more details.


And further ahead....

What's On in our Galleries

Exhibitions

Our gallery on the second floor of A' the Airts continues to host rolling exhibitions of artwork, embroidery and photography by single professional artists, art groups and talented local amateurs. We try to vary the exhibitions throughout the year to ensure that visitors to the centre can view and experience a wide range of genres. Most of the artwork displayed is for sale, some at very affordable prices – definitely worth a look!

Throughout the rest of the building we also have artwork from local schools on permanent display and examples of work from A' the Airts Arts & Crafts Groups. We are proud to be able to showcase the artistic talent growing in the local community.

Forthcoming exhibitions include:

"Creative Sanguhar":

An exhibition of artwork, crafts and photographs by Sanquharians of all ages, both amateur and professional. It will include work from local schools and contributions from our own arts and crafts groups. The exhibition has been designed to celebrate Sanquhar's talent as part of the Day of the Region weekend on 6th and 7th of October, but will run until the 24th October.

"Influences": Exhibition of paintings by Irene Gall. 27th October – 21st November

In this exhibition popular local artist Irene Gall interprets the main influences on her work, from Cézanne and the Colourists to Picasso and the Futurists. This Irene's second solo exhibition since A' the Airts opened.



Embroidery Exhibition: "Fabric Jewels" 24th November - 4th January

Margot McIntyre and Shirley McKeand - both well-known embroiderers and designers from Dumfries - will be showcasing a variety of their work from the recent past. Everything from exquisite goldwork pictures to large embroidered panels, jackets, bags and more!

The collective theme of Julius' work celebrates love, motherhood and Uganda and is summed up by the title "Mama Ubuntu".

Doug Curran - A True Local "Airtisan" And Man of Many Talents!

I'm sitting in Doug and Wilma Curran's house in Crawick, listening to the exquisite sounds coming from his new, beautifully handcrafted autoharp. Doug stops playing and proceeds to enthusiastically

describe the complexity of making this unique instrument, right down to the butterfly shaped sound hole that is his trademark.

I thought I'd find out a bit more about Doug's interest in musical instruments. Little did I realise that this was only the tip of the

iceberg. Doug's talents and interests extend far beyond that of his skills as a luthier.

Doug and Wilma moved to Crawick, on the outskirts of Sanguhar, 37 years ago. Doug was born and bred in Wigtownshire, then spent many years working in the Far East and England as an aircraft engineer before returning to Scotland to be near his parents. Over the years, Doug was exposed to many influences which inspired his diverse range of interests and talents. A poet of some renown. Doug has been a "makar" most of his life. One of his first memories was that he "...got belted at school for writing poetry". Rab Wilson eventually took an interest in his poems and got them published (some can be read in the "Chuckies fur the Cairn" and "Sanguhar Pattern" collections) and his reputation as a poet took off from there. He made several broadcasts for BBC Ulster's Ulster/Scots language programme "A Kist of Words". He has also recorded for the Scots Language Centre in Perth and participated in "Poetry Doubles" initiative with the celebrated Irish poet Paul Durcan.



Some of you might be familiar with Doug's poignant poem "Ina", which was featured in one of our earlier newsletters. The poem had such a profound effect on Dumfriesshire artist Sheila Mullen that she felt compelled to paint her interpretation of Ina. This original piece of artwork was on display in A' the Airts for a number of months. and attracted a lot of interest. but proudly hangs in Doug and Wilma's dinina The poem was inspired by a disturbed

young woman who lived close to Doug's family in Wigtownshire when he was young. Doug has also written several short stories about life in Galloway, including some about the hermit, Johnny Logie, who lived on the shore adjacent to farm where Doug's father worked.

Doug specialises in making stringed instruments and has been doing so for half a century. He made his first quitar in the 1960s out of a broken piano and an old wardrobe. Much of his inspiration stemmed from an old family friend, Jack Brown, a Gallipoli war veteran who lived in Sanguhar and who made guitars and fiddles all his life. Over the years he has also hand-built mandolins, dulcimers, hummels and autoharps. Each piece is beautifully crafted. with woods sourced nowadays from specialist suppliers. His instruments are in much demand and he sells all over the UK and Ireland, but has never had to advertise. Orders come through personal recommendations.

He doesn't claim to be a great musician (although I would dispute this claim) but says he plays all the instruments he makes - he had to learn to play the dulcimer when he started making them because no one else could play them locally! His wood-working skills extend beyond musical instruments - he also makes and repairs clocks, combining his fine craftsmanship with the technical skill which came from his engineering background.

Despite all this, Doug's real passion is for racing motorbikes, a hobby which has distracted him from his poetry and instrument making. His hand-built racing bikes have been ridden by former world champions and he even built a three-wheeled sports car, which won the best Kit Car Award at the Culzean Castle Classic Car. Show ten years later. But this was no kit car it was hand built from scratch in the workshops at Sanguhar Tile Services, where Doug was Engineering Director. Doug still has the car stored in his garage.

Doug is, indeed, a man of many talents. A' the Airts is hoping to have a small exhibition of his work throughout October. Please pop in and have a look.

"O Joys an Tears" -Historic Sanguhar Film resurrected!

We are delighted to announce that we have just been given permission by the filmmakers (Being There Productions) to have a public screening of this ground-breaking film about the history of Sanguhar.

The film was made in 2001, the year of the terrible foot and mouth epidemic. This meant that for the first time, horses would not be involved in the annual Riding of the Marches. Rather than be disappointed about this, the film makers - Francis Lopez (writer, producer, director) and Kenneth Caldwell (camera, producer, editor) - saw it as an opportunity to record something very special in the history of the town - and the town did indeed rise to this very difficult challenge and delivered an occasion that was very memorable.

The story was told through the thread of the poem by Rab Wilson called 'O Joys an Tears' and is the history of the town as told by the events as witnessed by the castle. It details the agricultural changes, world wars, population shifts and so much more.

O Joys an Tears took a year to make and Francis Lopez says that he learned so much about the town from the research he did before-hand and also from the people who were interviewed.


Extract from the film's cover:

"..... a highly emotional documentary tracing the history of the district surrounding Sanquhar, a small picturesque town in Upper Nithsdale in south-west Scotland. For over a thousand years the castle's battered walls have witnessed the passing of time and the changing face of the town that sought its protection.

The journey begins with the discovery of a mysterious golden Lunula made 4000 years ago and ends with the problems faced by the town's annual Riding of the Marches caused

by the disastrous foot and mouth outbreak in 2001.

Famous names such as William Wallace, James (Admirable) Crichton and Robert Burns all have their associations with Sanquhar.



As the local coal industry crumbled in the 1960's, the 'job for life' became a relic of the past. People whose roots in the area span generations, are forced to leave and seek work and those that remain learn to adapt through the Joys an Tears."

Either Francis Lopez or Kenneth Caldwell (or both) will be there to answer questions about the making of the film and Rab Wilson will be there to read his specially commissioned poem "O Joys and Tears". Some of you may wonder why we're called **A' the Airts**. The name comes from a Burns poem composed as he rode down the Nith Valley to Dumfries to see his beloved wife Jean:

Of a' the airts the wind can blaw I dearly love the west For there the bonnie lassie lives The lass I love the best There wild woods grow and rivers row And many a hill between Both day and night my fancy's flight Is ever with my Jean

As an arts and crafts centre we have taken the name to indicate that we are about arts in all its many forms – popular, amateur, professional, literature, creative arts, films and performances.

In fact "airts" is actually a Scottish word for "places". This is fitting too. Although the centre is based in Sanquhar it brings together all the communities of Upper Nithsdale, including Kirkconnel, Kelloholm, Wanlockhead and surrounding rural areas – and we welcome people from places further afield to visit!
